November 2018 to present	2018 Employed by the Department of Antiquities of Libya, and on March 2019 I was appointed the head of the World Heritage Sites Office which is tasked with the support and follow-up with the newly created World Heritage Site Management Offices, my responsibilities include supporting the staff of these offices in regards to capacity building, supervision, in addition to preparing the state of conservation reports and other related UNESCO issues.
February 2018 to November 2019	Team member of Training in Action project. A project funded by the British Council Cultural Protection fund, and involves Durham University, University College London, and King's College London. The project focused on training staff from the Department of Antiquities of Libya on GIS, remote sensing, and aerial photography to identify and record all archaeological sites/evidence and monitor them through targeted field survey, in addition to object cataloging on site and basic preventive conservation in museums. My tasks included interpretation of lecture, assisting in the training, and supervising and facilitating field work.
